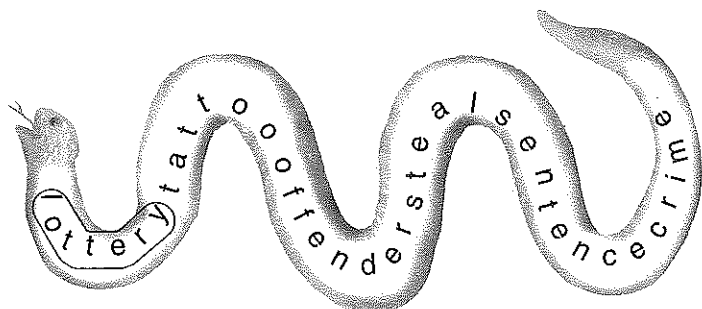

Teenage crime has fallen!

A study of teenage crime in the USA shows that the numbers have actually fallen. The study shows that the number of assaults by teenagers has fallen by an amazing 67% since 1993. In addition, teenagers are eating more, smoking less and drinking less alcohol.

Why are American teenagers committing fewer crimes? "Teens are much less likely to

commit a crime if they don't drink alcohol," says Police Inspector Rider. "Also, there are more after-school activities available these days. There are more places to go to dance, play sports and help people in their community. Because teens are spending less time on the streets, they are committing fewer crimes."
